Unit Title: The Cold War

Unit Abstract:

A look at the Korean War during the Cold War era. This lesson establishes the causes and effects of the Korean War as well as compare/contrasts the different types of government and societies in North and South Korea.

Content Area(s): American History II (Reconstruction – Present Day)

Targeted Grades: 10th

How Will This Unit Be Integrated into Your Curriculum:

The Cold War and the Korean War are discussed at length in American History II. This unit will fit nicely into the curriculum already established for this course. Students will gain a solid foundation of knowledge on the Cold War and apply it to the causes and effects of the Korean War.

Time of Implementation (how and when will the unit be implemented):

This lesson will be implemented in March 2012 during the Cold War unit in American History.

Big Idea:

Students will understand the causes and effects of the Korean War and how their societies (North and South Korea) have grown and changed since 1953.

Essential Questions (Do these questions reflect the core idea as judged by experts in the discipline):

- 1. What are the causes and effects of the Korean War?
- 2. How has the Korean War shaped the government and societies of North and South Korea?

Students will do a comparative study on the differences between North and South Korea today and the impact the Korean War had on them.

Students will be graded on a homework assignment on the Korean War (to be completed after lecture on Korean War), Inside North Korea facts and observations, and a final comparative study project.

After the listening to the guest speaker, Dr. Eiji Suhara, on March 24, 2011, I gained more knowledge of the differences between North and South Korea.
